

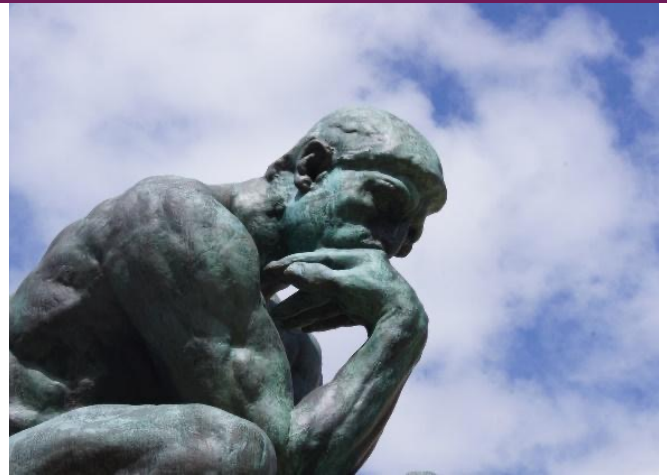
REP: Religion, Ethics and Philosophy

Why this course is right for you

Do you enjoy grappling with the fundamental issues of life? If so, then this course will empower you with the skills to critically interrogate and debate questions that humans have wrestled with for centuries.

This course is a genuine mix of Religious Studies, Ethics and Philosophy in equal weighting. Within this course you will explore the development in thought of one of the world's major religions, debate what it means for an act to be considered morally good, and delve into the philosophical challenges faced by theists.

Through studying this subject you will develop your ability to think deeply and critically in relation to a variety of topics. You will also hone your ability to write at length to develop logical chains of reasoning in order to justify your positions.
