Sociology is the study of human relationships and social structures; how society is organised and how we interact on a mass scale. It covers topics such as family, education, religion, crime and social power.

If you are interested in societal issues or enjoy the political and social elements of History and enjoy writing essays and researching independently, you should study this subject.

In studying Sociology you will gain a much greater understanding of how humans interact in society and what shapes their behaviour. You will develop your analytical, research and communication skills and become an inquisitive, questioning learner and member of society.

Beyond A Levels

A level Sociology students typically go on to study a variety of different subjects at university including Sociology, Psychology, English, Business Studies, International Relations, Politics and Teaching, amongst others.

Sociology students can go into careers in social work, victim support, policing, researching, teaching, policy planning, media, criminology, and nursing, among many other professions. Sociology is about the study of people and groups and society, and is therefore relevant to any future job or qualifications you will do.
